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Coated Quartz - Natural or Treated?

Coated quartz crystals are always popular and easy to find. Go to your local Michael's and you'll find them. You see that at metaphysical bookshops and souvenir shops. They are included in jewelry, art and crafts all over the world. Most of the wide array of colorful and iridescent crystals for sale are coated with metal. The metals commonly used are gold, silver, titanium, indium, niobium and copper.

Quartz crystals are infused with metals in a vacuum chamber using heat or an electrostatic charge called magnetron ionization.

This process bonds the metals to the quartz and therefore the coating is permanent and can't be scraped off.

"Aura" Quartz comes in many colors.

Aqua Aura quartz is coated in gold and is a sky blue color with subtle iridescence.

Angel Aura has a beautiful light rainbow iridescence caused by a special coating process (CVD) involving platinum and silver.

Titanium quartz had a deep, vibrant rainbow sheen achieved with titanium oxide. This is also called flame aura.

Some coated quartz is naturally occurring.

Structure of the quartz itself and is not a coating.

The most common type is Hematite coated quartz. These specimens range in color from orange to deep red. They can be single crystal points or large clusters worthy of display.

Quartz can also be coated in Iron Oxide. It's rust and tends to look like rust, grainy and rough.

Turgite (hematite and goethite) can coat quartz and create a beautiful "rainbow lichen" effect.

Limonite on quartz is orange to metallic gold in color.

Other natural coatings are Orthoclase (Feldspar), Chlorite, Malachite, Chrysocolla, Calcite and Dolomite.

Note: Some clear quartz is naturally iridescent - although this effect is caused by the surface



WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

Engraving is an art of incising a design on surfaces of metal plates, wood, glass, stone, jewelry or plastics. Many people practice engraving for various purposes and to create beautiful ornaments. When practicing engraving at home, it is important to protect yourself from accidental injuries by having better tools in an organized setting. An engraver's block or a rotating vice can assist users to achieve better results for their works.

Soft metal plates made of zinc or copper are good to use for practicing. After etching a design onto a plate with acetone, the outline of the design can be traced with a sharpie and then followed by a carbide tip (or a diamond tip) scribe pen. This makes it easier to engrave using hand gravers. High speed steel (HSS) gravers can be purchased without handles. It is essential to have sturdy handles for your gravers otherwise it can affect your work. Also, we need to see better to improve quality of the engraving. Optivisors, magnifying glasses, or microscopes are being used by people who engrave small objects.
