## WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichroic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.



A lot of people enjoy making glass art and glass fusion. So, we are going to try fusing some glass with a microwave kiln. We will need a few things before getting started: a microwave kiln, kiln papers, kiln wash or kiln primer, and some glass pieces of the same coefficient of expansion (90 COE or 96 COE). Please remember always wear goggles and heat resistant gloves and use a dedicated microwave for fusion.

Kiln wash or kiln primer comes in powders which is to be mixed with water at a particular ratio and coat onto the kiln platform. This is to prevent hot glass sticking to the kiln. This coating needs to be prepared and dried before using the kiln.

Prepare some glass pieces, arrange them in the shapes you like and use a little superglue to keep the pieces together. It is advised by many to use the same COE glass so the fused glass may remain intact. Inside a microwave (minimum 900 watts to be optimal), place a kiln paper on a kiln platform, and place the glass pieces to be fused on the kiln paper. Then, put the top part of the kiln on the platform and so it's ready to fire. The firing schedules may be different; I use 50% power for the first 3 minutes, and then the following each 3 minute increments with 100% power. For the pieces here, they took 12 or 15 minutes before showing a glow on top of the kiln. Wait a few minutes before removing the kiln from the microwave and set it on a tile or granite for at least 2 hours to cool. After opening the top part of the kiln, make sure the fused glass has cooled before handling them. If you like to learn more about glass fusion, ask Pam and Don for more helpful tips and tricks in making beautiful fused glass.
