Meeting adjourned at 9 pm.














APRIL BIRTHSTONE: DIAMOND

The word 'diamond' derives from Greek word 'adamas' meaning unbreakable because of its sheer strength. The gemstone has a Mohs hardness of 10, and it is the most sought after gemstone since ancient times. Its color can be transparent, black, grey, green, red, blue, yellow, purple, pink, brown or orange. Diamond is formed very deep within Earth's Mantle about 100 miles under the earth's surface. It was formed under immense pressure and much harder to find than most gemstones. They are often faceted and highly prized as decorative jewelry among collectors.



It is the given gift of the 10th, 60th and 75th wedding anniversaries. Diamond is the gemstone that is made out of one single element, carbon. It has a cubic crystal system and adamantine luster. Its value depends on its carat weights, color, clarity, and cut.

WORK SHOD BITS & TIPS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

















Visit our workshop whether you like to make a cabochon, cut a slab, break a geode or spend your weekend mornings among some heavy duty machines. You can bring a rock you collected to cut and polish. Our workshop officers also provide a bucket of rock slabs (shown above) for members to use. If you see something you like to work on in the bucket, you're welcome to use it.

Petrified Forest National Park is located near Holbrook, Arizona. This area had a tropical climate and a dense forest about 225 million years ago. Many trees lived and died here, and were buried by the river sediments with a high silica content deposited by volcanic ash.

How is petrified wood formed? Petrified wood forms when woody material is preserved by sediments from decay with the help of organisms and oxygen. When groundwater rich in dissolved solids flows through these sediments, replacing the woody material with silica, calcite, pyrite or opal. This results in the formation of a fossil retaining the details of the bark, wood grain and structures. Many fallen trees and branches can be preserved by the sediments for millions of years but the formation of fossilized tree logs and branches take only few years when groundwater rich with minerals flow through these sediments. Two forms of silicification preserve most of the petrified wood specimens. Agatized wood was replaced and infilled by chalcedony, and opalized wood was replaced and infilled by opal. Both can be called silicified wood.
