
DRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

AUGUST BIRTHSTONE: PERIDOT

Peridot is the birthstone for those who are born in August. It is an abundant mineral and it occurs in an olive green or yellowish green color. It has a Mohs hardness of 6.5 to 7. In rare cases, peridot may be found in medium dark green color. San Carlos Apache Indian Reservation in Arizona is the major source of peridot olivine. This gemstone is mined at other U.S. locations such as New Mexico, Nevada, Hawaii, Arkansas, etc.

Many large peridots in the museums worldwide came from Zabargad, a Red Sea island. This island was the first discovered source of peridot dated since the ancient Egyptian time. Mining of peridot has begun around 300 BC. Smaller pieces of peridot are usually faceted to make jewelry and/or use for decorations. Three masses of peridotite rich in the gemstone peridot olivine are located in Zabargad.

Peridot contains iron, magnesium and silicates. It green color is due to 12%-15% of iron content. It can be mistaken as emerald. Rare finds are the cat's eye and star stone peridot.

PYRITE

Pyrite or iron pyrite is known as fool's gold. It is shiny and it resembles gold in its yellowish color. Pyrite is the Earth's most abundant sulfide mineral. This specimen of pyrite was unearthed by a geologist from the Palo Verde Peninsula in CA.













WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

TUMBLED STONE N PEBBLE ARTS

It is interesting to tumble stones and rocks. Tumbled stones are beautiful and they can be used to create 3D pictures. Let's paint the landscape on a piece of plywood or a canvas. Then, use some dried branches and natural green moss to decorate the landscape. Different types of gules may be used to fix the small pieces in place. Tile glue is good to use for the tumbled stones, and vinyl and plastic glue is good to glue the branches and moss. These glues have a longer working time and are very forgiving if adjustments are needed as you are

decorating the landscape. The transparent vinyl and plastic glue gives a better finish for your picture.

Once the adhesive was set, use a small paint brush to add more details for the landscape. A coat of clear painter's touch from Rust-Oleum helps seal and



protect your picture. There are tumblers, grits (from coarse to fine), and polishing powder for members to use at club's workshop. If you



have stones or rocks to tumble, please ask our workshop officers. They will be happy to show you.
