



The Gemstone Amethyst

Quartz is one of the most common and widespread minerals found on the planet. Quartz is composed of silicon and oxygen in the form of silicon dioxide (SiO2). It occurs as six-sided (hexagonal) crystals, and usually forms a pyramid at the top. Quartz has hardness



scale of 7, and is harder than most of other minerals. There are variety of colors among Quartz crystals range from transparent to translucent. It has a glassy luster on fresh surfaces. Their colors may be purple (amethyst), pink (rose quartz), black or dark brown (smoky quartz), orange (citrine), yellow (citrine), milky white to gray, green or blue. Amethyst is the purple quartz, and is the birthstone for those who are born in February. Scientists believe the purple color may arise from the amethysts' iron oxide content. It carries a wide range of purple shades.

The word amethyst comes from the Greek word "amethystos" meaning "not drunk," and was believed to prevent its wearers from intoxication. Amethyst is often found in geodes or associated with granitic rocks. It is usually cut faceted to make beautiful jewelry. It is widely distributed and can be found in the States of Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, California, New Mexico, North Carolina, Main, Maryland, Michigan, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Texas, Rhode Island, Virginia, and Washington. Commercial sources of amethyst come from Brazil, Uruguay, Mexico, and among others.

Amethyst fades in color with exposure to sunlight or heat. When heated to 400 or 500 degrees Celsius, an amethyst's color changes to a brownish-yellow or red. Heat may even transform an amethyst into a naturally-rare mineral called citrine. The color of an amethyst may fade over time making it less stable in comparison to other gemstones. Amethysts symbolize peace, courage, spirituality, wisdom and stability.













WORK SHOD BITS & TIDS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

HELDFUL TIPS TO MAKE CABS













CABOCHON MACHINE

Club's workshop is equipped with various lapidary machines for purposes of cutting, trimming, shaping, polishing, sculpting and more. Our cabochon machines come with specific combination of diamond and leather wheels that make the grinding and polishing of gemstones easier and fun. The machine has 2 diamond grinding wheels, 4 sanding and polishing leather wheels, and a polishing pad.

Start with far left diamond wheel (most course grit) to cut the stone into its desired final shape and size either it will be a standard shape cab or a freeform. Apply plenty of water while cutting cabochons. Use light pressure on the diamond wheels to trim and form their shapes, and avoid contaminations.

Use subsequent sanding/ polishing wheels to remove scratches made by the previous wheels and to remove any flat spots on the top surface of your cab. At last, apply diamond paste onto the polishing pad and polish cabs to shine.

LAPIDARY TIP

Too many irregular or odd shaped cabs that doesn't fit anything, and you don't want to do a silver finding around it? Here is a creative idea.

Glue small magnets to the backs and use them to hold notes on a refrigerator door or metal bulletin boards. A nice way it is to display your beautiful stones, and it's fun for a small gift item.






adobe houses, ruins, and wilderness, all are beautiful to us.

CFMS Field Trip-South Collecting Trip Lavic Siding near Barstow, CA February 17th, 2018

- This trip is open to all Rockhounds who agree to abide by the AFMS and CFMS code of Ethics, the directions of the field trip leader and practice safe rock hounding.
- Call the field trip leader beforehand for further information.
- Remember to sign in and out with the field trip leader.
- A Consent and Assumption of Risk Waiver of Liability form must be signed upon arrival at meeting site.

WHEN: Saturday February 17th at 8:00 AM

WHERE: Lavic Siding

MATERIAL: We will be collecting Agates and Jaspers.

MEET: Hector Rd off I-40 on the south side for orientation and sign in. Waiver of liability will be signed at the meeting spot. From the meeting spot we will caravan for about 20 minutes to collecting site. Contact field trip leader for additional information.

VEHICLES: No low clearance vehicles, most will be able to make it to the main collecting area, there is an alternate spot for those with 4X4. Gas and food are available in Barstow.

WHAT TO BRING: Collecting bags/buckets, rock hammer, digging equipment, safety glasses and spray bottles, First Aid kit. Bring lunch, plenty of water and a camera; this widespread field offers no shade so use sun screen and protect yourself. IF you would like to stay for the weekend, this general area offers a wide variety of material so bring your rock collecting guides.

NOTE: This is the heart of the Mojave Desert and the weather can be unpredictable at this time of year so dress accordingly. This trip may be cancelled at the last minute due to bad weather, so please feel free to contact us the night before if weather is questionable.

Treat the desert with respect -tread lightly and if you pack it in, pack it out.
