Intarsia/ Commesso

Intarsia/ commesso is an art of joining pieces of stones together by utilizing techniques to create a smooth and flat surface. It requires some planning and a bit of patience. This art form was developed over the past 600 years in Florence, Italy, and had almost lost in Europe over the past 150 years. It is not being practice often in America due to the amount of time needed to in-



vest in this art.

If you have beautiful slabs and some spare time, taking on a piece of intarsia or commesso may be a very rewarding experience to have. For our members and visitors, it's also an idea to utilize rocks and slabs from opportunity drawings and door prize.

Conrad Grundke, who taught and practiced this art was one of American Masters of Stone artists. He went to be with the Lord this past December. "Discovering a Lost Art Form" by Conrad describes the how-to of intarsia/ commesso. The Gemstone Aquamarine

For those who are born in the month of March, aquamarine is your birthstone. Aquamarine has greenish-blue color and is one form of beryl. Beryl is a silicate of two metals, beryllium and aluminum, and it can be found in granites. Beryl is harder than quartz, and it forms hexagonal crystals with specific gravity of 2.6-2.8. It can be translucent to transparent with a vitreous luster, and is considered as a major gemstone. When it is green, it is emerald. When it is greenish-blue, it is aquamarine.

The word aquamarine comes from the Latin aqua, "water", and marina, "sea". The blue variety is the most valuable. Greenish stones can sometimes be changed to the highly prized blue shade by heating them in an electric furnace to 450°C (842°F). Aquamarine gemstone is often used for wedding rings or gifts in various occasion; it provides meaning of protection and strength.

Most aquamarine gemstones come from Brazil. It is also found at locations around the world, and in various US states like Colorado, California and North Carolina. In the mountains between Pacific Ocean and Salton Sea in southern California, and in the mountains near Spruce Pine, North Carolina are the two locations of interest for aquamarine. The aquamarine crystals were also found at the summit of Mount Antero, Colorado. The largest aquamarine in the world was a sea-green stone weighing about 50 lb. It was found in 1946 in Brazil, and brought to the United States in 1947 for cutting.









WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

TIPS TO CUT SLABS









SLAB SAW

Slab saws are used to make straight cuts in your rocks. It allows us to slice bigger pieces of rough to slabs for individual's crafting purposes.

First, fit your rock in the vise. Your rock should be secured easily and fitted firmly in place.

Use wooden blocks to wedge between the rock to be sawed and the vise to give stability if needed, and tighten the screws. Keep the vise jaws tighten and as parallel as they possibly can.

Next, use set screw to adjust the start of the cut and make sure the rock surface meets the blade at a right angle, but not in contact with each other. Lock vise carriage in position. Check the oil level in the saw for it should cover 1/4 inch of the blade at the bottom. Adjust a metal chain to a desire length and attach it to the automatic shut off valve. Close the hood of the saw and

start cutting. For safety reason, do not lift up the hood when the saw is in operation.

After finishing cutting the first piece, the machine stops automatically. Lift up the hood when the saw is no longer revolving. To prevent injury, be very careful while operating any machinery so nothing get caught in the moving part. Unlock and glide the vise carriage back to the start position, and turn the set screw to adjust thickness of the next cut. Set the rock next to the blade very closely without touching it so the rock surface does not bind against the blade. This allows the blade to revolve freely before engaging the rock to avoid damages to the blade. When ready, close the hood and start cutting your next piece of slabs.
