Meeting adjourned at 8:30 pm.





DOWN

- 1. Composed of decayed wood under pressure. Used a lot in mourning jewelry in Victorian era.
- 3. Petrified tree sap. Gem in Jurassic Park movie.
- 4. Best found Russian gem known as emerald by day, ruby by night.
- 5. November birthstone. Mohs hardness of 8.
- 9. The hardest gemstone.
- 13. Red corundum. Prized stones have a color known as pigeon blood.
- 14. Comes in many colors. Ancient times was mistaken for ruby.
- 16. Transparent or translucent chalcedony, often has banding.

ACROSS

- 1. Opaque chalcedony often with banding or spots.
- 2. Only gem to have (& exhibit) a special effect (phenomena) named after it.
- 6. Commonly banded black & white chalcedony.
- 7. Dark blue stone often with gold colored flakes. Used a lot in ancient Egyptian jewelry.
- 8. Deep green colored Beryl.
- 10. Comes in all colors. Often confused with zirconia. December birthstone.
- 11. Acronym for gem found inside some sea shells.
- 12. Often round gem made inside shells of organic nacre.
- 15. Found all over the world in many colors. Mohs hardness of 7. January birthstone.
- 17. Gemstone also named "Fool's Gold".
- 18. Light Green Stone that can be found in some meteorites. August birthstone.

CHIPS 'N' SPLINTERS

MARCH BIRTHSTONE

Aquamarine and blood stone are the March birthstones. Aquamarine is a type of beryl and has a Mohs hardness of 7.5 to 8. Its color range from sea blue, deep blue to greenish, and the blue color aquamarine is the most desirable color. This stone is translucent and has a glass-like luster when faceted. Brazil is the leading producer of aquamarine and the largest aquamarine gemstone was mined in Marambaya, Brazil. It was 243 lb, and cut into many gemstones of total more than 100,000 carats. Bloodstone is also referred to as Blood Jasper. The stone has a hardness of 7, and is composed of dark green chalcedony with spots or splatters of red Jasper in it. The red color is due to its iron oxides. It is usually cut into cabo-chons and polished to fabricate various jewelry.



WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

CUTTING ROCKS AND DOPPING PREFORM \overleftrightarrow



Spring has arrived! As the weather is getting better, come out to the workshop to cut a few slabs or some roughs. Rock tumbler is also available to use if you have small rocks to polish.

Geodes begin their formation as a bubble inside a vocanic rock. Some geodes are hollow inside and some are full of microcrystals or calcites. Nodule is referred to those round ones that has a solid inside. One can break open a geode using a hammer, or to cut it with a rock saw at the workshop. There are wood pieces available to fix your rock if you're cutting a rock into slabs.

Use the templates to draw the shapes or patterns of your cabochons, and create rough cabochons by using trim saw. There are wooden dop sticks to use with wax, and a few plastic sticks to use with superglue to secure the perform cabochons.

Mookaite is a type of quartz and it is also called Mook Jasper. The stone has beautiful red, yellow, white, brown and pink colors. It comes from Western Australia, and has been used as a healing stone by Australia Aboriginal people. The aboriginal word "mooka" means "running waters". Hundred tons of mookaite have been mined from Mooka Creek in Australia.
