



The Gemstone Emerald

For those who are born in May, beautiful green emerald is your birthstone. Beryl is a silicate of beryllium and aluminum metals. Members of beryl family are determined by their colors. Emerald is the green variety of beryl mineral. For instance, heliodor is yellow, morganite is pink, and March is represented by blue aquamarine. Beryl has a hardness of 7 1/2 to 8,



and it occurs in igneous rocks such as granites and pegmatites. They can be translucent, transparent, opaque or glassy looking. Emeralds are harder than quartz, and their shades of green range from light, dark, medium, medium dark to deep intense green.

The fine emerald is among the highest valued gemstones, and is difficult to find. For over 5000 years, emerald has been a very desirable gemstone to be sought after in many ancient civilizations. Most emeralds have inclusions and fractures inside the hexagonal crystals. The emeralds from Muzo, Colombia, have been recognized top of its class since the middle of the sixteenth century. They are mostly deep green varieties. Brazilian emeralds are also good qualities but come in lighter greens in comparison to those found in Colombia. Emeralds have been found in other localities such as Madagascar, Siberia, Pakistan, Russia, Australia, California, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Massachusetts.


Emerald is usually faceted for jewelry fabrication. The rectangular emerald cut is referred to a specific design that a gemstone is faceted. It is also called a step cut which consists of rows of 58 facets (25 crown, 8 girdle, and 25 pavilion). It is a less brilliant cut yet preferred by many since this cut reveals the classic elegance of the faceted stone.

WORK SHOD BITS & TIDS

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

TIPS FOR MAKING ROCK CLOCKS








There is something about a rock clock. By having them on the wall adds a nice touch and personalize the space. A beautiful slab can tell a story, and it's also fun to make a clock.







The small bench drill is easy to use for drilling a hole at the center of the slab. Mark the spot on the slab where the clock mechanism will be installed. Position modeling clay around the center of the slab and fill in water. Press the drill bit on slab surface for few seconds then lift up to allow cooling. Always use plenty of water to prevent overheating and damages to the slab and drill bits. Repeat steps until the drill bit comes through to the other side. By using modeling clay to hold water, operating the drill press without a helping hand becomes easier and manageable.

Once the hole is made, it is time to prepare the slab surface for polishing. A flat lapping wheel is useful for this purpose. If the surface of the slab is rough or have saw markings, start with 60 grit, then move up to 180 grit, 220 grit, 400 grit, and 600 grit. When a surface is smooth, 220 grit can be used to start. Then, polish the slab with oxides.

You may find a template or a picture of a clock face in the computer. It is also easy to search for a free template on the internet and download it. Print out the template and use it as a guide to position the dials (the fixed numbers) on the slab. Finally, install beautiful clock mechanism and hands. A bracket can also be mounted on the backside together with the battery housing.
