




# **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

# **WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS**

The workshop is open to all members the first full weekend of the month. Pam & Don Greene our Workshop Officers are flexible. Call (949) 548-0752 for alternate times if needed.

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

# $\underline{\mathsf{STONE}\,\mathsf{CARVING}} \quad \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar$



The most important thing to remember when carving a stone is to protect yourself by wearing safety glasses, dust mask, and gloves. Some stones such as granite, sandstone or soapstone may contain asbestos. Therefore, it is needed and required to wear a respirator when working with these stones.

People often use ornamental stones for carving. Some stones are harder and more difficult to work with. Choosing the right tools for your stones will make the carving much easier. Hard stones like Agate, Jadeite or Jade are popular minerals to use for carving. It is helpful to use diamond cutting wheels, burrs and drills to form and shape these stones. In addition, a good quality flexible shaft rotary tool is considered an essential tool to use for stone carving.
