### **OCTOBER BIRTHSTONE:** Opal and Tourmaline

Opal is mined in Mexico and Australia. It is not a crystalline form, but a hydrated amorphous form of silica containing between 6 and 10% of water by weight. It is classed as a mineraloid. This mineraloid has a Moah hardness of 5.5 to 6. Its color can be white, red, orange, green or colorless. It flashes its brilliance with a tiny bit of movement, and thus this precious stone is named "to see a change of color". Opal of darker colors are usually more vibrant in colors, and are more valuable than those of lighter

colors. Black opal is the most prized opal. One carat of black opal may be valued up to several thousand US dollars.

Tourmaline is the most colorful gemstone and mineral. Its colors can be red, pink, blue, white, green, colorless or multicolored. They can be transparent to opaque. It is a crystalline boron silicate mineral which contains trace elements of aluminum, iron, magnesium or lithium. Tourmaline is a series of different minerals with unique chemical and physical properties. It has Mohs hardness of 7 to 7.5. Almost all the gem varieties of the Tourmaline came from the member group Elbaite. Black Tourmaline is also called Schorl, and is often not used as a gemstone.





# **WORK SHOP BITS & TIPS**

The Workshop is fully equipped with tools to make cabochons from start to finish, as well as a small kiln for dichotic glass work and also jigs for wire working. In addition, rough stones and materials are available for members to practice on.

## $\underline{\mathsf{GEMSTONE TREE}} \quad \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar \bigstar$



It is easy to make a gemstone tree. There are kits available at the club meetings. It comes with various gemstones, some wires, and basic instructions. All the gemstones were tumbled, pre-drilled, and ready to be used. We can add additional tumbled stones to the tree. It is best to use diamond coated drill bits with water for drilling holes in the stones. Simply follow the basic instructions provided in the kit. Here are the steps.

- 1. String bead onto center of wire, and twist wire to lock bead into place
- 2. Add beads on each side of middle bead
- 3. Twist wire into "branches" then twist wires together below "branches"
- 4. Add another layer of "branches" to create a "limb"
- 5. Make several "limbs"
- 6. Twist two "limbs" together to make larger "limbs"
- 7. Twist those "limbs" together to form the "tree".
- 8. Twist the ends of the wires together to form three or more "roots"
- 9. Glue the tree "roots" to your favorite rock, and use rubber bands to hold them in place until dry
- 10. When glue has dried, remove rubber bands, and arrange branches as desired.
