

It always amazes me as an artist when I am asked to explain how something 'artistic' is done, or if I could do it. While very happy to compley I am constantly taken a'back on how simple an explanation is needed artist to artist and how such detailed a description is required to the non-artist, and often after such description I am met with the, 'I'll take your word for it', speech and facial expression. You probably know what I am talking about. That piece you've been working on that proved more problematic then what you first thought and when you finally finish it doesn't get quite the recognition you think it deserves. You just KNOW they have NO idea what it took to get to the finished piece. And often trying to explain gets lost in translation of too many words or not enough.

I am constantly reminding myself that what may come naturally sometimes to me, others may just not understand as I do, and I realize that sometimes if I spend time trying to explain maybe both of us may benefit.

here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5S4C4WGNk10 (after the first link should show series of the next) from Van Cleef and Arples. Each video shows some of the different process they go through making a piece of jewelry.

In a nut shell -the process/videos:

- 1. The Designer: comes up with a coherant design
- 2. (after acception) the Maquette Artist makes a 3-D model
- 3. Then goes to Gemologist to estimate \$ and find stones.
- 4. The wax maker, who makes the piece out of wax to be cast.
- 5. The castor and polisher
- 6. The bench jewler for clean up
- 7. the stone setter (but not before another polish)
- 8. Stones set -back to final polish and finish.

In the end I realized some companies have whole different departments for what I alone take on not including business management!

If your a sole artist filing all those shoes it may be a good way to explain the process to those left brain thinkers!



Rubies are Red and
Sapphires are Blue,
Both are Corrundum and

Septembers Birthstone and also the 5th and 45th anniversary stone.

Sapphire is the mineral corundum with a MOHS hardness of 9. It comes in all the colors of the rainbow, even color change and also the phenonium of asterism in star sapphires.

When they are red their called rubies when blue called sapphires, Other colors and it's called by the color name then sapphire.

Clear or white sapphires are still used today as diamond stimulants thou they have no dispersion (fire).

Abundant sources are found in Southeast Asia, Australia, and Africa.

The largest carved sapphire is 61,500 carats and is called the Millennium sapphire, 'each carving represents a great mind, inventor or creator throughout recorded history'.



99% of all sapphires are heat treated to try and improve color and clarity





There is also a lot of synthetic sapphire made mainly by a process called flame fusion.

You can find synthetic sapphire in many places not just gemstones. For example clear sapphire is used for watch faces and even may be used on the 'glass' scanner at your local grocery store, as sapphire is more hard and durable than glass.



You really can't go wrong with this gem as it spans all colors and phenominon and is widely available.
